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1. Introduction

Established in 1945 by the people of Tezpur, Darrang College was permanently affiliated to Gauhati University in 1953. With the motto of "Be a Jewel among men", it has been uninterruptedly working for the fruitful dissemination of knowledge to its pupils with the solemn aim of making them worthy citizens of the country. The claim has been justified by a large number of alumni glittering in the national and international arena. To assess the quality of our educational programs, services, and facilities, as well as to identify areas for improvement and enhancement; each year Darrang College conducts a Student Feedback survey to provide actionable insights that will inform decision-making and initiatives aimed at enhancing the overall development of the institution.

This report has been prepared based on the feedback received from the Students of Darrang College during March 2024. This report provides a comprehensive overview of the feedback gathered from students. It serves as a valuable tool for assessing the quality of our educational programs, services, and facilities, as well as identifying key areas for improvement and enhancement.

Aims and Objective of the survey: This report serves as a valuable tool for:

- Assessing the quality of our educational programs, services, and facilities, as well as identifying areas for improvement and enhancement.
- Providing actionable insights that will inform decision-making and initiatives aimed at enhancing the overall student experience

2. Methodology:

2.1 Population of study: All the students of PG and UG of Darrang College.

2.2 Sample Size of the sample is 1944.

2.3 Sampling Technique: A total of 1963 no's of students responded to the survey out of which 1944 responses were selected for final data interpretation. 19 responses are rejected for various reasons like incomplete demographic data, blank responses, etc.

2.4 Tools used for data collection: A 14-item non-standardized self-prepared 5-point Likert scale is used to understand various aspects of the student's college experience, including teaching and learning, campus resources, extracurricular activities, and student support services. The Likert scale was created by Rensis Likert in 1932. The Likert scale is a type of rating scale. A rating scale is a measurement instrument used to determine a respondent's attitude toward self, others, or situations. Since it is 5 points, it contains a midpoint and allows respondents to be undecided. The purpose of the Likert scale is to determine a respondent's attitude or opinion regarding themselves, others, or situations. The Likert scale allows researchers to obtain quantitative data from qualitative notions such as providing respondents with a statement and asking them to respond on an agree/disagree continuum (Waltz, T.B.2023).

Google Form: A link is created by using Google Form including the survey questioner. Google Forms is a survey administration software included as part of the free, webbased Google Docs Editors suite offered by Google. The service also includes Google Docs, Google Sheets, Google Slides, Google Drawings, Google Sites, and Google Keep. Google Forms is only available as a web application. The app allows users to create and edit surveys online while collaborating with other users in realtime. The collected information can be automatically entered into a spreadsheet (Wikipedia 2024).

- 3. **Procedure:** The Google form including the survey questioner circulated to the students of UG and PG of Darrang College from 19/03/2024 to 25/03/2024 through the website of Darrang College Tezpur. A total 1963 no's of students responded to the survey out of which 1944 responses were selected for final data interpretation. 19 responses are rejected for various reasons like incomplete demographic data, blank responses, etc.
- **3.1 Statistical tools:** For analysis of data Tables, Pie charts, Line graphs etc are used.

3.2 Ethical Consideration: In this current survey ethical concern and confidentiality is maintained. When necessary, their identity and other confidential details are removed.




Figure 1 shows the graphical representation of the sample by gender.




Figure 2 shows the graphical representation of the sample by Stream.




Figure 3 shows the diagrammatic representation of sample by different semesters.

are PG student and 1855(95%) are UG students.




Figure 4 shows the diagrammatic representation of the sample by UG and PG.




Figure 5 shows the diagrammatic representation of the Table 5




Figure 6 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 6




Figure 7 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 7




Figure 8 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 8




Figure 9 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 9





Figure 10 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table10






Figure 12 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 12




Figure 13 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 13




Figure 14 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 14




Figure 15 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 15




Figure 16 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 16




Figure 17 shows the diagrammatic representation of Table 17.






The Diagrammatic representation of Table 19 is shown in figure 19 .Byanalyzing table 19 and Figure 19 a high percentage is observed in statement 3 (76.38%) followed by statement 10(74.42%) and statement 1(74.11%) . A low Percentage is observed in statement 7(65.87%) followed by statement 11(67.93%).

4 Conclusion:

The conclusion can be drawn from the analysis of the feedback of the students that students are satisfied with the academic environment and infrastructure of the college. They are also satisfied with the quality of teaching in the college. Students find that the course is made relevant to their real-life experienceby extending it to practical aspects of the matter. Yet they feel that not having sufficient ICT enabled classesmake their learning experience less enjoyable to some extent. Another issue which causes concern is that institution has to go by the conventional curriculum which does not make them job ready in the present context without doing some additional course.

By analyzing the results of the survey it is found that

The areas where the majority of thestudents are satisfied with are.

1. The quality of the teaching in the college (Statement 3)

2. The teacher links the subject to real life experiences and creates interest in the subject (Statement 10)

3. The programme they are undergoing in terms of the content of the courses in different semesters. (Statement 1)

The areas where the majority of the students are not satisfied with are.

1. The uses of ICT and online tools in the classroom.

2. Curriculum in terms of job readiness

The areas where the majority of the students are satisfied with are the quality of the teaching in the college; the teacher links the subject to real-life experiences and creates interest in the subject. And the areas where the majority of the students are not satisfied with are ICT and online tools in the classroom and the curriculum in terms of job readiness.

Authority is advised to increase the nos. of ICT enabled classrooms, and install available nos. of Smart panel, Projector etc in every department. And also advised strengthening the placement cell and career counselling cell and introducing skill-based certificate courses and soft skill courses to prepare the student for future job opportunities.
